Overview of Bills

- **SB 1400** (Chief Patron: Senator Saddam Azlan Salim) & **HB 1870** (Chief Patron: Delegate Katrina Callsen):

Regulation of algorithmic devices that use nonpublic competitor data for setting, recommending, or advising landlords on rent prices and occupancy levels

- HB 2047 (Chief Patron: Delegate Bonita G. Anthony):

Builds on previous bills and proposed an Algorithmic Rent Pricing Ombudsman to offer structural support to oversee inquires, complaints, and violations pertaining to the use of algorithmic pricing



Algorithmic Pricing Devices

- What is it?

Algorithmic pricing: data-driven pricing strategies that use various input data to populate algorithms (e.g., mathematical equations) in order to generate a suggested price

Algorithmic pricing devices: software that rely on nonpublic data manually inputted and/or granted access to by property managers and landlords

- Why does it matter?

Concerns around coordination, collusion, and price fixing when nonpublic data is used to generate a recommended rental price across competitors
